Jan Klaassen is the principal figure of Dutch folk puppet theatre and originated in the second half of the seventeenth century. He is a hunchback, has a large 'boozy nose' and wears a colourful suit. He has a pointed cap on his head with a little bell that leans forwards. Jan is an ordinary lad from Amsterdam, who has a way with words and a good sense of humour. Those who do him an injustice can count on a scornful remark or a good beating. The club is a favourite object in folk puppet theatre. Hand puppets clasp this batting implement tightly between their tiny hands. The club is sometimes used to beat a rhythm on the back of the head of one of the opponents on the stage, or to poke him or her in the stomach. The devil is a well-known character in traditional puppet theatre. He gives the main character a hard time, but he always manages to outsmart him. Jan Klaassen is 'sure as hell not scared'.
